

In-Class Activity: Exploring Party Position Data Using the Chapel Hill Expert Survey

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Assignment originally designed for POL 201: Introduction to Political Studies at the American University of Sharjah

Learning Objectives

- Apply new concepts of party families, issue positions, and dimensions of party competition to specific cases
- Gain an introductory-level understanding of using a data source to visualize and compare party positions

Time: 30 minutes

Instructions

1. Open the Chapel Hill Expert Survey: <https://www.chesdata.eu/>
2. Go to 'CHES Stats' page
3. Build one (1) bar graph
 - a. 2019
 - b. any country
 - c. position on an issue that interests you (not salience or dissent)
 - d. sort by values
 - e. click to download PNG file
4. Refer to the 2019 codebook (<https://www.chesdata.eu/ches-europe>) for:
 - a. measurement of the position you've chosen
 - b. party names for the abbreviations
5. Research two (2) of the parties represented on the graph (Hint: Wikipedia actually does provide good introductions to political parties)
 - a. What party families do they belong to, and how does this help explain their positions on the issue you have chosen?
 - b. Explain in a short paragraph
6. Submit paragraph and graph on iLearn Discussion Board (your university's online learning management system forum)

Variations

- For a European politics course, students may choose a country that is a core case study of the course or that they are studying for a research project.
- For more advanced courses, have students compare positions and salience or dissent across issues/countries/party families.
